

Serving as director for my second year, the focus has been on enhancing our existing program offerings and expanding the role of technology in our school. We have been able to add laptops in the school age classroom as well as provide lead teachers with computers for planning and classroom use. Additionally, we transitioned to HeadMaster, which is a comprehensive administrative, billing and communication module of ACS specifically designed for schools. The switch to HeadMaster has streamlined our bookkeeping and helped us communicate more effectively with preschool families.

Program offerings in the school continue to grow in scope and creativity. We have been blessed with the addition of Mrs. Kristy Gordon to our staff, as the Music & Movement teacher. Under Kristy's direction, the preschool and the church came together to perform a wonderful children's Christmas Program. The preschool students were also invited to sing Christmas carols with the Senior Shepherds, which was a hit with all involved! Youth Ministry Report

In 2017, the youth group experienced many opportunities for growth, fellowship, and strengthening their relationship with God and community, just as they did in 2016. This year important themes of faithful service and asking critical questions about our faith were introduced into their various forms of faith instruction. Sunday school has seen a dip in attendance but is compiled of a core group of students both in middle and high school. After dinner on Wednesday evenings, the youth group split into small groups known as refuge groups, for an hour of fellowship, Bible study, and discussion surrounding current events in their lives. In addition to this traditional meeting, the middle and high school students occasionally met as a whole group for small mission opportunities and discussion regarding the Christian response to important current issues. Examples of mission opportunities are working at Stand up for Kids, helping organize food and school supplies, and making Christmas cards for our homebound members. Sunday evening youth meetings were offered on a weekly basis during the school year. During this time the youth have dinner, play games, and have Bible studies. Bible studies were instructed under a theme of "faithful service." The studies took in depth looks at Bible stories surrounding difficult decisions individuals made based on their faith. During the summer months, the youth met in various church member homes for our summer meeting series known as FISH (Fellowship in Someone's Home). The youth group participated in various special events and outings. We enjoyed a mission trip at Epworth by the Sea, cleaning up local parks and beach fronts. The youth also broke a local record of amount of oyster barrier reefs bags in only a few short hours! The youth also participated in a local community fall retreat, traveling to Tennessee for a weekend of worship with 3 other local churches.

Church wide events such as the Trunk or Treat and Easter Egg hunt were a huge success for the surrounding community. The youth group played an integral role in these events. This year the annual tradition of the Maze of Mystery was slightly tweaked even more, and the youth put on an interactive maze for our guests in the basement of the fellowship hall! Other events the youth have participated in included VBS, the Lilburn Co-op food drive, and church work days. The high school youth also participate in a weekly bible study at Starbucks in Barnes and Noble. We discuss current issues, life at school, and difficult scripture verses that stir up many questions in the youths' lives and context.

Our goal of putting on a critical lens when examining our faith has sparked many incredible conversations and continues to strengthen relationships within the youth group – next up, getting the youth to build on those relationships with the rest of the congregation.

Clerk's Report

The Clerk of Session prepares the session agenda and records the minutes of all session and congregational meetings. The Clerk is also responsible for maintaining membership rolls and registries of pastors, baptisms, and elders. As the liaison to Presbytery, the Clerk handles general correspondence and submits the Annual Statistical Report. The Presbytery of Greater Atlanta reviewed our minutes in April 2017 and determined that our minutes are complete and in good order.

In January 2017, we installed new Elders Andrew Parker and Paul Ferre. Andrew was ordained as a first-time elder. Roxanne Lau had been on Session to complete another elder's term and was installed for a new 3-year term. This left the Session with 13 elders which is 2 elders short of a full slate of 15 elders. We worked through the year with only one elder moderating Buildings & Property (Richard Folger) and no elder moderating the Communications Team. The duties of the Communications chair were shared by the elders of the CCE&F and MO&E teams.

During 2017, there were 5 new members who joined by profession of faith, reaffirmation of faith or certificates of transfer from other churches. There were no new confirmands during the year. There were 6 members removed from the membership rolls after receiving Letters of Transfer from other churches. There were 6 faithful servants of God to join the Church Triumphant this year including Clyde Williams, Danna Reid, Homer Overstreet, Linda Martin, Roy Brown and Alice Demore. The Session voted to remove another 33 members due to inactivity over the past 2 years. In May, we baptized Isla Elizabeth Ristic, daughter of former member Alyssa Ristic and granddaughter of John and Renay Van Brunt. Isla lives with her parents in England.

There were 303 active members at Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church on December 31, 2017.

Good Shepherd is represented at presbytery meetings by Dr. Weekley and 3 additional commissioners. Those meetings were held each quarter at various church locations around Atlanta. Each of our active elders on Session participated in at least one Presbytery meeting during the year. Thank you for your time and willingness to serve.

Thank you to Sharon Huber (Office Manager), Lori Moore (Accountant), and Jeanine Calia (Office Volunteer), for their assistance with preparing reports and updating the official minute books throughout the year. Their help has been essential and is much appreciated.

Building and Property Report

Maintaining the physical plant of a church where the buildings are 20+ years old is a daunting task. Routine maintenance is on a continual basis. However, in 2017, Good Shepherd faced repairs that were certainly not routine.

The stucco exterior of the Sanctuary building had extensive water damage so severe that one wall was near collapse. There was certainly not money in our budget, so we began the Critical Care Campaign to tackle the problem. This campaign was successful way beyond expectations. The objective was to make this a 4 year plan, but money pledged was enough to do three phases in one year. All the stucco repairs were made, and both the Sanctuary and Fellowship building exterior were painted. There were even enough funds to install a new roof on The Well. The fourth phase will be to make improvements on the Christian Education building.

During 2017, there were numerous projects that added beauty and function to our church.

- The Women of the Church raised money to provide the hand rails for the steps up to the pulpit area.
- The roof covering the walkway was repaired in two days by the hard work of numerous volunteers.
- Landscaping outside of the Sanctuary was accomplished by volunteer labor. This project even included a
 drip irrigation system.
- The paint on the preschool walls in the hallway sustained damage from tiny little hands and needed repair. Again, this was accomplished by volunteer help.
- The kitchen floor in the Gilead House sustained major damage from a water leak. The floor was replaced with a new wood laminate. This repair was a major joy for Michael and Cherilyn.
- To provide better and more efficient lighting, the Sanctuary was upgraded with LED bulbs.

The project that had a profound effect on worship at Good Shepherd was the new sound system installed in 2017. Not only did the system make a giant improvement in the sanctuary's sound quality, but the addition of the video capability enhanced the mission of our church. We can broadcast services on our website. We can record a DVD of weddings or funerals. In the future, live streaming of services will be possible. This new technology will greatly enhance the work of Good Shepherd to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

As is obvious there are many projects that are done by volunteer workers. A church cannot function without the members using their skill and labor. Good Shepherd is blessed to have a congregation which is generous with their time, talents, physical and financial contributions. All this together is what makes God's church succeed.

Congregational Care, Engagement & Fellowship

WHY

The focus of the Congregational Care Ministries is to care, support, and engage the congregation spiritually, physically, and emotionally through faithful living within the Body of Christ. We strive to create an environment so that all who gather at Good Shepherd feel the love of Jesus Christ within their heart and life.

WHAT

Responsibility: To nurture and support the congregation of Good Shepherd in the spirit and compassion, hope and love in Jesus Christ and to provide events and activities that will contribute to discipleship and fellowship of the members of Good Shepherd.

We first want to thank all of our team leads and the many, many volunteers who work with them to implement the "WHY" and "WHAT" that our team represents and provides for Good Shepherd. You are all, each and every one, appreciated and are a blessing from God for what you do!

The Adopt a College Student Ministry at Good Shepherd helps our congregation reach out to and stay in touch with our college students. The program matches up church members with students starting college in September and lasts until the beginning of May. This year we had 30 students adopted by our congregation with 27 families, adults, parents or groups adopting. This ministry supports and stays connected with our students by sending cards, texts, emails, phone calls (if they answer), and goodie boxes.

Our <u>Angel Meal Program</u> provides freshly prepared meals to those who are going through a stressful time such as an illness, a death in the family, the joy of a new baby, or those otherwise exhausted, both physically and emotionally. Donna Hudson coordinates meals with approximately 136 volunteers from our congregation to provide whatever is needed; a breakfast, lunch and/or dinner or even baskets put together and delivered to a hospital for family members waiting during surgery. Our Angel Meal Program has been very busy this year providing meals for 12 families throughout the year, as well as meals for families before and after memorial services. And to fill other needs, cash and gift card donations were contributed.

Our <u>Bread Ministry</u> continues to deliver bread to visitors who have visited for a second time. Many people do not leave their contact information which limits our ability to deliver loaves. But for those who do receive bread, we pray that this gesture will make them feel welcome and want to come back and worship with us. <u>2017 Team Lead: Ann Owen</u>

The <u>Grief Support Ministry</u> began in the fall of 2010 to provide support to families mourning the loss of a loved one. Good Shepherd provides a series of 4 letters and 4 books sent out on a set schedule throughout the year to help our people work through their grief process. Each book helps the reader better understand what he or she is experiencing and provides hope and encouragement. Those receiving the books say they are very helpful, arriving just at the right time in the grief cycle to provide comfort and peace as they read them and then pass them on to other family members. The cost of the books with postage is \$15 per member. The designated funds for this ministry have been depleted; therefore this ministry will now be funded through our CCEF budget going forward. 2017 Team Lead: Criss Crissman

The <u>Membership Attendance Ministry</u> is a team of approximately 6 members who contact our missing members with cards, telephone calls and personal contact. Our membership team endeavors to keep our members and regular visitors "in touch," encouraging their participation in worship services and other programs our church offers. It is hoped that absent members realize they are missed and are welcome to return to Good Shepherd's fellowship anytime. This group also informs session when to drop a member if needed and for what reason. Ginger Stapley volunteers in the church office and records attendance in the church's ACS system to help this team keep current with their task. Our <u>Military Support Group and Flag Dedication</u> ministry honored our military veterans this year in November. Our veterans were recognized and honored, and patriotic music was highlighted and enjoyed during our worship service that day. In October, Charlie Black presented Good Shepherd with the US Flag that is now posted on our flag pole. This flag is in honor of his cousin, Lt. Col Roy Douglas Black, USMC, Retired, who passed away December 30, 2015.

Our New Member Sponsor Ministry strives to help our new members and regular visitors begin to connect with and feel a part of our church family. Each new member receives an information packet about all the programs and opportunities our church provides. This year an effort has been made to assist all of our new members in this way. We feel that it isn't just programs that keep people in a church; it's the relationships they forge with God's people. <u>Cub Scout Pack 502</u> has been with Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church for 34 years. Cub Scouting is a year-round, family-oriented part of the Boy Scouts of America program designed for boys who are in first through fifth grades (or are 7, 8, 9 and 10 years of age). Pack 502 meets each Thursday evening in the Fellowship Hall from 6:30-8:00pm.

Our <u>Undershepherds</u> were busy serving approximately 71 of our church family suffering ongoing illness, living in assisted living or rehab facilities, recuperating from surgery or those in mourning for a lost loved one. The current team consists of 16 active members who made 113 visits and sent 102 cards to our "Sheep in Need." Our Undershepherds also deliver prayer shawls. In April, 10 Easter Lilies were delivered to our shut-ins and in December, 14 poinsettias were delivered. Visitor Bags are distributed each Sunday to first time visitors. The bags are intended to make our first-time visitors feel welcome as well as inform them of all the opportunities to participate in the ministries at GSPC. The bag consists of lists of our upcoming programs, such as Women of the Church, Men of the Church, Singles Ministry, Music ministry and Youth programs; current 3-month church calendar; and seasonal activities such as Advent Season calendar. We also include a GSPC coffee mug, a gift certificate for Wednesday Night dinner for 4, a pamphlet "About Being Presbyterian", a Welcome Brochure, a Russ Weekley business card refrigerator magnet, and candy. This year we created a Visitor Center in the Narthex where we can greet our visitors, answer questions and hand out our visitor bags as information for them to take home instead of handing them out at the beginning of the service. We are sad to see Tom and Sharon leave us to move to South Carolina. They have been amazing at keeping up this ministry for years. FELLOWSHIP

The <u>Women of Good Shepherd</u> provided a variety of fellowship, learning and mission opportunities throughout 2017. Our lady's bible study circles, which included two traditional and one online class, met regularly through the year, with only a break in the summer months.

- January A Happy New Year fellowship meal was enjoyed at Provino's Italian Restaurant.
- February February included "A Day in the Garden" luncheon. Our own Sarah Roberts, VP of Goizueta Gardens at the Atlanta History Center was guest speaker. February also provided a trip to Fernbank Science Center and a book review of "Water from my Heart" by Charles Martin.
- March Our WOC generously donated and installed sanctuary hand rails to access the chancel area (one by the pulpit and one by the choir area). A total of 24 people attended a "Tour of the Fox Theater" on March 11th. March also included our annual ladies tea with Kelly Weirch (2015-16 Atlanta Presbyterian Women Moderator) serving as our guest speaker. WOC had their annual collection for the children of Thornwell in February and March. The items collected were delivered on March 17-18 by those attending the annual mission workday.
- April Mission Haven is a home for Presbyterian Missionaries. A workday was held on April 22nd to help clean and organize the facility.
- May The Grand Finale Luncheon was held on May 21st to celebrate the end of the WOC 2016-2017 calendar year. Secret Prayer Sisters discovered their prayer partners in this program. Our ladies also made approximately 40 necklaces, which were taken as a gift of good will to women in Indonesia.
- August During the month of August, our WOC sponsored a church-wide collection of hygiene products
 for our StandUp for Kids mission. The 2017-2018 Season Kick-off Pot Luck Luncheon was held at which 26
 ladies signed up to participate in the "Secret Prayer Sisters" program. This meaningful program partners
 ladies who anonymously pray for one another and send cards and messages of support throughout the
 year. After the luncheon our ladies assembled 101 hygiene kits for the StandUp for Kids mission. This
 group was amazed and grateful for our contribution.
- September Many participated in the "No-Sew" Project to make fleece scarves for the Clifton Men's Shelter and StandUp for Kids (Homeless Teens). 81 scarves were made and donated.
- October Movie Night provided an opportunity to see the movie "Mountain Between Us." Phase one of a
 WOC project to spruce up our ladies room was completed by painting and redecorating the ladies' room in
 the CE building as part of this in-house service project.
- November The Annual Women's Fall Retreat was held. WOC sponsored a congregation-wide Haiti book drive which raised \$1,067 for Haitian children. The 2018 Cookbook fundraiser began with a collection of favorite recipes from our congregation. A pre-sale campaign was held and cookbooks are slated for completion in spring of 2018.
- December Stocking suffers and small gifts were collected and donated for eight teenage Thornwell girls living in the Sarah Cottage. A Christmas shopping trip to the Alternative Gift Market at North Decatur Presbyterian Church was taken by 15 of our ladies.

Yoga for Christians has been going strong now for almost three years. The goal of the ministry is to bring the benefits of yoga — unity of body, mind, and spirit using breath, movement, and stillness — to give the student a "grounded and whole" place from which to serve others and therefore God. Classes are held in "The Well," but attendance has now increased enough that a new larger location may be needed. Since its inception, the class has been donation-based (recommended amount \$5.00). 20% of all donations received are sent to different missions. 2017 Team Lead: Kathleen Ploussard

JoyDance is a unique ministry that utilizes scripture, prayerful meditation and dance. Not only is this ministry strengthening people's bodies, but more importantly, it also renews their spirits and grows their relationship with God. We all feel God's amazing presence during JoyDance. Since starting JoyDance at GSPC in early 2017, the ministry has experienced growth. Initially, JoyDance would only attract 2-3 people per event. These days, it is more common to have 5-6 people per dance. Since spring 2017 we have had 60 individuals attend 19 dance sessions. It is also important to note that this ministry is serving people outside of GSPC. Two people who are not members of GSPC have attended JoyDance on and off throughout the year. We hope to continue this ministry during 2018. We pray that the ministry will continue to grow in regular attendance in 2018 and that it will continue to connect GSPC with the larger community.

2017 OUTREACH HIGHLIGHTS

- o Easter Approx. 350 attendees (32 were 1^{st} timers). Approx. 50 people contributed eggs, 10 made sandwiches, and 9 adults plus youth manned stations that explained parts of the Easter story.
- o Trunk-or-Treat Had a challenge due to weather. 50+ volunteers (including youth from Trickum MS, Boy Scouts, and PAX foreign exchange students) helped the approx. 850 attendees participate in 20+ doorway "trunks", multiple games, a bouncy house, cookie decorating, meal preparation/service, and a Mystery Maze led by GSP youth. Only the hay ride had to be cancelled.
- o Farmer's Market Continues to increase in attendance. Hay rides pulled by Dave Adcock tractors has helped to increase attendance. During the 13 Fridays (June 2nd–August 25th) approx.. 9,100 people came through the Market.
- o Parent's Night Out Tina Wright held 5 PNOs with an average of 27 children per night (30-35 is our max).
- o Community Garden A \$1,500 grant enables the purchase of a tiller & supplies to build a storage shed. Shed construction started in November. Larry DeBoer & Chris Calia attended a seminar in Ashville that covered alternate farming styles for community gardens. A May workday included 20 AT&T volunteers & 15 youth. Tim Daley held a vegetable gardening workshop that was attended by 25 people (8 of which had never been to GSPC).
- o International Student Activities Dec. 18th 78 in attendance (12 CIH + 3 staff, 10 HS +17 PAX, 9 GSPC) made Christmas cards & decorations, participated in tree decorating & gingerbread house building contests, and decorated cookies. Activities were followed with dinner & more fellowship.
- o The COPS Program was added to GSPC outreach efforts. Officer Edward has been assigned as the COPS representative for our church. The purpose of the program is to increase positive relationships between police & citizens.

2017 EVANGELISM HIGHLIGHTS

- o Evangelism efforts have been dubbed "Fishers of Men" The "Evangelism Made Easy A Little Less Scary!" started in 2016 & led by Joy Fisher of the Presbytery finished the last 2 workshops.
- o Larry Deboer continues to build a sub-team to develop evangelism ideas to focus on bringing more families with younger children to the Word of God at GSPC.

- o Bread Ministry Ann Owens continues to deliver a loaf of bread to visitors, usually after their 2nd visit. The bread is delivered with additional information about GSPC. Larry DeBoer usually follow ups with a phone call if the visitor provided their information.
- **o** A "Welcome" Center was approved & is in our Narthex each Sunday morning. Joanne Folger coordinates the volunteers to man the Center. Volunteers work to identify visitors, insure they are greeted, and provide them with more information about GSPC.

MUSIC and WORSHIP

2017 was certainly a wonderful year for our team, but it was also a year for significant changes: We said loving, appreciative good-byes to both Jennifer Langley-Director of Music, and Harriet Woodward-Music Associate. Both of these ladies led us for many years with their dedication and talents. Another significant leadership loss was that of Kate Dilks, who has been a Music & Worship Elder for the past six years (fortunately, she has agreed to stay on M & W as a sub-team leader).

On the bright side, we welcomed two wonderful new staff members to GSPC and our team: Laura Leigh Beall-Director of Music, and Jody Gragg-Music Associate. We owe a great deal of thanks to the volunteers who both planned and led our music offerings during the interim before our new staff leaders came on board – Jean Ann Crites-Morris, Bryan Dilks and Brandon Phillips.

Another change to report was the movement of the Memorial Team from Finance to Music and Worship. We will help coordinate this sub-team and oversee the recording and accounting of gifts to the Memorial Fund (the Session has approval authority over how Memorial funds are spent).

Of special note is the wonderful impact the Youth Choir Tour to New York state had on both those representing Good Shepherd, and on those who heard and enjoyed their presentations. The letter from 1st Presbyterian Church, Corinth, NY states in part, "We thought your program was excellent, that you were outstanding representatives, and that the spirit of the entire endeavor was positive and focused on grace". Special thanks to ALL who helped make it possible!

2017 was another year of wonderful special services at GSPC. These included the traditional Ash Wednesday, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Easter services, as well as four Advent and two Christmas Eve services. Additionally, we appreciated the excellent Gifts of Women, Scout Sunday, All Saints and Community Thanksgiving (joining with Trinity Lutheran, Westminster Pres. and Redeemer Church) services. December was also very memorable because of the both the vocal and instrumental "Tapestry of Light" cantata, and later the wonderful Lessons and Carols service.

Of course, we experienced the normal, operational expenditures for such things as piano tuning, acolyte awards, worship supplies, music, folders, pens, etc. We also experienced some unusual costs, which included Chancel candle fuel and four new sound enhancement devices for hard-of-hearing worshippers. Our largest single expenditure was for our organ. Some badly needed speaker driver replacement was accomplished, along with a way overdue inspection/adjustment of the organ's on- board computer. The Session decided to pay for this work with capital funds.

On a brighter note, the Greater Atlanta Presbytery approved our grant application for \$50,000, which is dedicated for sanctuary enhancement! John Chavatal ably led this team of volunteers which included Kate Dilks, Richard Folger, Paul Ferre, Bob Seibert, David Diener and Tom Middlebrooks. This group spent countless hours in research, planning and study to bring about this magnificent award. In competitive bidding, Dillon Productions, Atlanta, was awarded the contract for installation of equipment, and training of GSPC volunteers. Among other things this grant provides for audio/video recording and live streaming of worship; new equipment including three new, modern sanctuary cameras and a new up-to-date sound board; and badly needed re-wiring of existing speaker systems.

On May 21, 2017, we celebrated the baptism of Isla Elizabeth Rustic, daughter of former member Alissa (Van Brunt) Rustic. Isla is the granddaughter of John and Renay Van Brunt.

Continuing their wonderful ministries of music were these choirs and ensembles: Sonbeams, led by Whitney Duncan; Winds & Brass, led by Bryan Dilks; Hand Bells, led by Becky Backfisch. These next choirs were all led by our Director of Music: G3 Youth Choir, Shepherd's Sacred Children's Choir, Millennial Voices of Praise (young adults), and the Chancel Choir.

NOMINATING WHY MESSAGE: The Good Shepherd Presbyterian Church Nominating Committee is comprised of six members and one current Session member who serves as the Chair. The Nominating committee serves an important role in the life of Good Shepherd because they seek to invite members of the Church to serve Christ with their gifts and passions. We are called by Christ to serve one another. We are to encourage, uplift, pray for and with each other (Hebrews 10:19-25). The Nominating Committee invites and equips leaders to prayerfully consider serving as Elders or on a committee. HOW MESSAGE: Responsibility: To present recommendations for vacancies on the Session, Personnel Committee, Long Range Planning Committee and Nominating Committee. The Congregation elects Elders and Nominating Committee members. Also, the Nominating Committee will make recommendation to the Session for the Offices of Clerk of Session and Treasurer, with the election to be made by Session.

The Nominating Committee used the following process to fill vacancies.

PROCESS TO FILL LEADERSHIP POSITION BASED ON LEAD LIKE JESUS

STEP 1: Approach the person by introducing yourself as a Nominating Committee member. Tell them that we would like to invite them to a conversation with us about leadership at GSPC. Ask them to take 1 week to prayerfully consider whether they would like to have the conversation. (At this point, they can tell us NO right away in which case we say thank you and move on to our next candidate). If they agree to take the week, let them know if they agree to have the conversation we would like to have it in that second week. Example: We approach John Doe on June 15. He says he would like to pray on it. We say thank you and we will talk to you next week. On June 22, we seek him out and ask if he has decided and what day that week would be good for him to meet with 2 members from the Nominating Committee.

STEP 2: 2 members of Nominating will set a time and place to meet with the candidate. This is the time to get to know them on a more spiritual level. We can use the questions on the discernment list or ones that may present themselves in the conversation. We need to have some prepared but be flexible and go with the conversation. We will have packets of information to share with them. Our packets will have the WHY statements (both from Session committees and Nominating, Long Range, and Personnel). If the candidate clearly states that they are not interested in Session but are open to another

committee, we will give them those documents only. If they are interested in Session, we will give them all of the Session committee documents. We do not make any decision for the Session Committees. That's the Pastor, Clerk of Session and Nominating Chair's responsibility (We do give opinions on some who would be better suited for certain Committees). We will give them 1 week to make the decision whether to serve or not.

STEP 3: At the 1-week time, we will set up another meeting to answer any questions the candidate may have and ask for their decision.
